Read, Write Inc.

We will be continuing to follow our reading and phonics scheme and the children will be bringing home a 'book bag' book regularly, carrying on from the colours they had in Year R. Please ensure that these books are kept inside their plastic wallets to avoid damaging them. The children will be reassessed during the term.

However, please remember that our Home School Agreement states the parents will hear their child read at least three times a week. It is important that this is recorded in their reading records. Your child will change their books according to their colour group time table.

Adventures

WHERE THE WILD THINGS ARE

In **Science** we will be learning to identify, name, draw and label the basic parts of the human body and say which part of the body is associated with each sense.

In **PE** we will be working on our sending and receiving skills e.g. throwing and catching. PE days will be Monday and Thursday.

In **RE** we will be thinking about the features of celebrations and exploring how Christians celebrate Harvest.

In **Music**, using an old-school Hip Hop style, we will be learning about the differences between pulse, rhythm and pitch.

For **PSHE** we will be meeting our 'brain' to learn about how our brain affects our emotions. We will also be recapping the Zones of Regulation to support their emotional understanding.

In **Art** we will be using different materials and resources to create spiral artwork.

Writing:

We will start this half term with a continuation of Drawing Club. We will then be looking at the books 'The Smartest Giant in Town' and 'Where the Wild Things Are'.

Handwriting:

This will be a big focus throughout the year. Children will be encouraged to form letters correctly, ensuring consistent size and shape. This will be a daily activity in school and please practise lower and upper case handwriting at home.

Read, Write Inc:

The children will be continuing to follow the Read, Write Inc. programme remaining on the colours they ended on during Year R. They will then be reassessed at the end of the half term to allow them to move colour groups if appropriate.

In **Computing**, we will be learning about the different parts of the computer.

In **Geography**, we will be using simple compass directions and locational and directional language to describe the location of features and routes on a map. We will be drawing the features and landmarks found on our routes to school.

Maths: Number and place value

- Count in ones, forwards and backwards to 20
- Read and write numbers from 1 to 20 in numerals
- Know one more and one less than any number in 20 and use the language of: equal to, more than, less than (fewer), most, least.
- Understand what each digit represents in numbers to 20 and represent these numbers with structured resources.

Addition and subtraction up to 7

Measurement

- lengths and heights (e.g. long/short, longer/shorter, tall/short, double/half)
- sequence events in chronological order using language such as: before and after, next, first, today, yesterday, tomorrow, morning, afternoon and evening
- recognise and use language relating to dates, including days of the week, weeks, months and years

Problem solving: Solve mathematical problems or puzzles, to recognise simple patterns, generalise and predict.

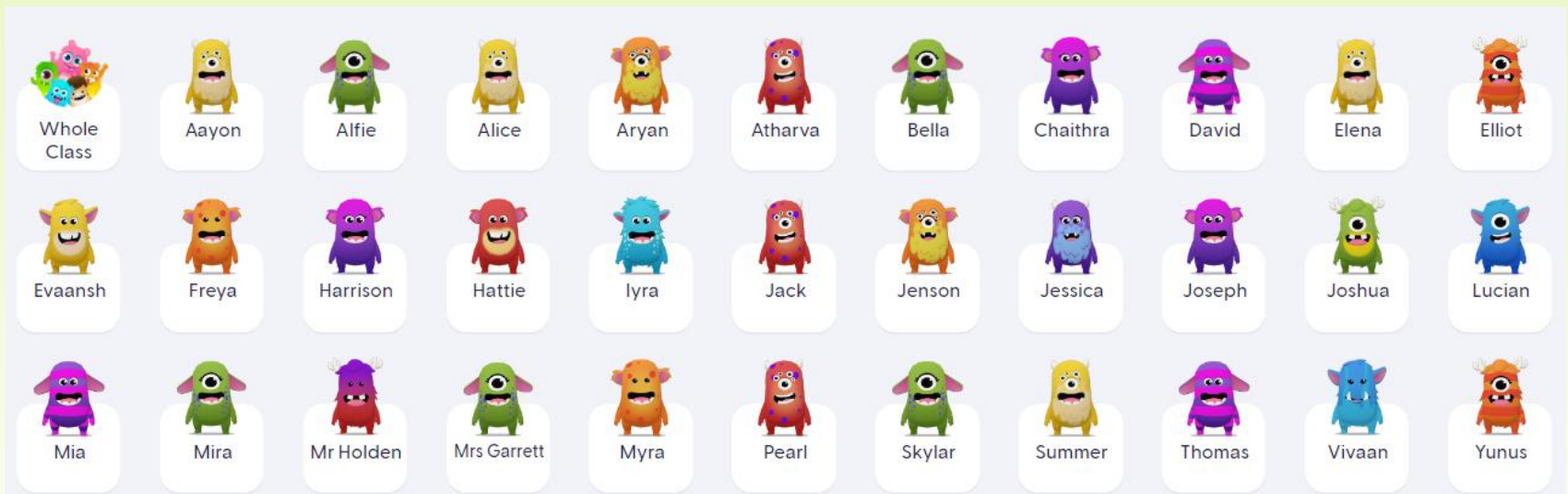
Independence

- Working independently
- Hanging up coats
- Bringing in book bags and water bottles and putting them away on their own
- Earrings being taken out if possible for PE, if not, tape over them
- Names on all items of clothing!!!
- Doing up their own laces

Rewards 😊

- Head teacher's award (with hot chocolate!!)
- Star in a jar – whole class reward
- Star of the week award - 2 children each week
- Class Dojos – each child is given an alien avatar





- Children can earn individual dojos (points) and whole class points.
- Once they reach a certain milestone they will receive either a bronze (35), silver (70) or gold (100) certificate for their behaviour.

It is not a race through reading groups there are many skills involved!

Children need to be exposed to words several times before they become fluent and automatic. They also need to re-read books to develop their comprehension and fluency

National Phonics Screening Check – Year 1

- The National phonics screening check is a statutory assessment that was introduced in 2012 to all Year 1 pupils.
- All Year 1 pupils will take the phonics screening check in **June 2026**.
- It comprises of a list of 40 words; 20 real words and 20 nonsense words (Alien Words).
- It will assess phonics skills and knowledge learnt through Reception and Year 1.

A bit of technical vocabulary...

Phoneme - spoken sounds - there are about 44 in the English language

Grapheme - how we write each of the spoken sounds e.g. the spoken sounds 'f' is written using the graphemes f, ff, ph.

Red words - words that cannot be sounded out e.g. I, said, they

Green words - words that can be sounded out using our phonics

Fred talk - (Fred is the frog) he can only talk in sounds e.g. sh-o-p

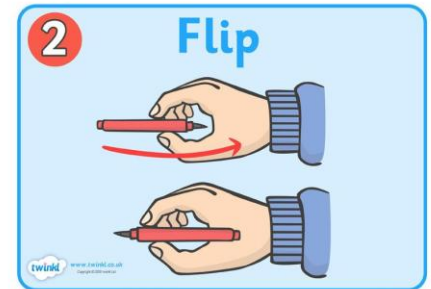
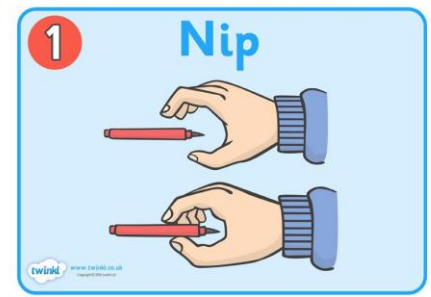

Handwriting

- Sit correctly at a table, holding a pencil comfortably and correctly
- Begin to form lower-case letters in the correct direction, starting and finishing in the right place
- Form capital letters
- Understand which letters belong to which handwriting 'families' (i.e. letters that are formed in similar ways) and to practise these



Writing Objectives

- Composing a sentence orally before writing it
- Sequencing sentences to form short narratives
- Re-reading what they have written to check that it makes sense
- Leaving spaces between words
- Joining words and joining clauses using “and” “because”
- Punctuate sentences using a capital letter and a full stop, question mark or exclamation mark

Maths

- Number formation
- Number bonds building up to 5/10/20
- Counting forwards and backwards from 100
- 15 minute maths in afternoon – mental maths.
- National curriculum incorporating a ‘Mastery’ approach

How to support your child at home

- Please read with your child at least 3 times a week and share their library book that they will bring home every Friday.
- Talking and playing is as vital as hearing them read. Don't make learning a chore! Try to make it as fun as possible!
- Encouraging independence (book bags, P.E bag, water bottles)
- Maths mental fluency
- Practise number and letter formation as much as possible!
- Purple Mash – children will have log ins in their reading records for you to access at home.

Home and School

- Water bottles – with a sports type lid. DO NOT PUT THEM IN BOOKBAGS!
- Labelled school bag only, please no backpacks.
- Please check your child's book bag daily.
